Shape the emerging research themes at University of Cambridge for the GCRF Collective Fund Interdisciplinary Research Hubs <u>call</u>.

- Both GCF and the Research Strategy Office (RSO) have been convening meetings for the identification of such themes. The most recent one, organised by RSO and chaired by the member of the GCF advisory committee Bhaskar Vira on 25th July, followed-up on four previously identified topics: 1) Resilience, Sustainability and Healthy Lives, 2) Violence Reduction, 3) Knowledge Infrastructure Inequity and 4) Labour Informality. Please leave your email here if you would like to be informed about the main outcomes of this meeting, namely the involvement of numerous GCF members on the new theme of Sustainable technologies for resource-poor communities.
- Cambridge-Africa is circulating a <u>short note</u> suggesting one way by which it might contribute to large-scale GCRF bids or other similar large-scale proposals.

Cambridge Global Food Security Symposium – 6th September, 3-6pm, Murray Edwards College,
University of Cambridge. A day of multi-disciplinary talks and interactive sessions - including talks by
Professor Tim Benton and Sir Brian Heap, two of the External Advisors of this Cambridge Strategic
Research Initiative. The symposium and particularly the afternoon session on *Developing Country*Challenges: GCRF and the Global Challenges Forum with Dr Lara Allen (Director, Centre for Global

- Equality) and Professor Howard Griffiths (Department of Plant Sciences) will offer the opportunity to establish working groups as collaborations between the Cambridge Global Food Security and the GlobalChallenges Forum.
- <u>Bioenergy 2017</u>, <u>Developing Sustainable Bioenergy Crops for Future Climates 24-27th September</u>,
 Oriel College, University of Oxford. The aim of this meeting is to bring together researchers, breeders,
 growers and policy makers concerned with the development of new bioenergy crops for future climates.
- REAP conference 2017 7th November, Chicago. Focusing on emerging farming practices and agri-tech
 that work with nature, the conference enables dialogue between researchers, technologists, regulators and
 early adopters about science, relevant metrics and consistent standards.

News

- Many congratulations to TIGR2ESS, led by Prof Howard Griffiths (Department of Plant Sciences) and to CAPABLE, led by Prof John Danesh (Department of Public Health and Primary Care) for having been awarded almost £15 million in GCRF funding. TIGR2ESS (Transforming India's Green Revolution by Research and Empowerment for Sustainable food Supplies) addresses global food security in India and CAPABLE (Cambridge Programme to Assist Bangladesh in Lifestyle and Environmental risk reduction to address public health challenges in Bangladesh) addresses public health challenges in Bangladesh.
- Identifying 'best connected neighbours' to stop the spread of infection in developing countries. Information about social networks in rural villages in the developing world is costly, time-consuming to collect and usually unavailable. Therefore, current immunisation strategies target people with established community roles: healthcare workers, teachers, and local officials. Cambridge researches found that a network theory approach-based algorithm leading to the identification of those with "most connections to sick people" can be more effective and easier to deploy than current policies in preventing disease spread. - UK Aid-related FAQ are answered in an accessible way in this briefing paper at the House of Commons Library. What is aid? What is the UN 0.7% aid target and why has the UK adopted it? Which government departments spend UK aid? What impact does UK aid have? What will be the impact of Brexit on UK aid?
- Development Monitor has used public financial data to show flows between the UK and developing
 countries. This analysis, which aims to promote transparency and accountability for the UK's interactions
 with developing countries, also includes an exploration of the how exposing the UK's full impact on these
 countries can improve better policies that benefit all.
- New centre for Global Disaster Protection. UK partnership with the World Bank and Germany for the
 Centre for Global Disaster Protection in London will support the poorest countries to strengthen their
 disaster planning and get finances in place before disaster strikes so they can better manage the economic
 impact of emergencies and build their resilience.
