## News

Selection of news published in October:

- Machine learning used to predict earthquakes in a lab setting. A group of researchers from University of Cambridge, Los Alamos National Laboratory and Boston University has used machine learning techniques to successfully predict earthquakes. Although their work was performed in a laboratory setting, the experiment closely mimics real-life conditions, and the results could be used to predict the timing of a real earthquake.
- Carbon capture universities and industry work together to tackle emissions. An international collaboration
  between universities and industry will further develop carbon capture and storage technology one of the
  best hopes for drastically reducing carbon emissions so that it can be deployed in a wider range of sites
  around the world.
- <u>Findings from new malaria database are a 'wake-up call'</u>. Researchers have compiled and analysed 115 years of malaria data in Africa, providing the most detailed picture yet of where efforts to control malaria infection are being won and lost across the continent.
- <u>Is cancer control in poor countries too high-tech?</u> Cancer control in developing countries focuses too much on expensive technology and too little on affordable prevention that can save lives, medical scientists warn
- Changing the face of Indian farming. Indian agriculture is expected to feed a growing and increasingly
  urbanised population. But if everyone wants to move to towns and cities, who is left to farm the land?
   TIGRESS, a new large-scale and multi-partner project, aims to answer this question, with the support of the
  GCRF and the Cambridge Global Food Security SRI.
- Conservationists' eco-footprints suggest education alone is insufficient to foster sustainable living. A new
  study by Conservation scientists from the University of Cambridge and University of Vermont shows that
  even those presumably best informed on the environment find it hard to consistently "walk the walk",
  prompting scientists to question whether relying solely on information campaigns will ever be enough.
- How do police think about assemblies in Africa? Large scale public assemblies and particularly political
  protests, are frequent flashpoints for interactions between police and the public all over the world, during
  which the police may—lawfully or unlawfully—resort to the use of force. The Centre of Governance &
  Human Rights (CGHR) is involved in developing a questionnaire to go alongside a training programme to
  survey police officers about their attitudes.
- UK to design new instrument to measure climate change and study star formation in space. UK scientists
  will play a key role in designing a new instrument to sit on board the International Space Station (ISS). The
  instrument will not only monitor the effects of climate change on the Earth's atmosphere but will also help us
  to better understand the origins of stars and planets.
- <u>Eight new PhD training centres to boost UK's data science expertise</u>. Data-intensive science in the UK has
  received a major boost thanks to an investment of almost £10 million to train the next generation of experts
  in this important research area.
- AHRC Heritage launched to enhance UK heritage research. AHRC Heritage Research, a priority area
  established to enhance heritage research across the UK, was launched in early October at a three-day
  major conference in London.
- Global antibiotic resistance tracking project launched. Wellcome Trust announced a new research project to track and document the burden of disease associated with antimicrobial resistance (AMR) in mid-October.
- <u>Decision Making Under Uncertainty Networks</u>. The research councils are driving action to develop a
  multidisciplinary research community focussed on decision making under uncertainty. Two networks, funded
  by ESRC, EPSRC and NERC, are working with practitioner organisations to analyse real world decisions

- and identify where multi-disciplinary research can develop new approaches to improve decision making under uncertainty.
- EDCTP. WHO AFRO and TDR join forces to fund implementation of health research. A new partnership has
  been formed between EDCTP, TDR (the Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical
  Diseases), and the World Health Organization's Regional Office for Africa (WHO AFRO) in recognition of a
  mutual interest in strengthening the capacity for health research in African countries.
- New ESRC CEO and Executive Chair Designate announced. Science Minister Jo Johnson has announced that Professor Jennifer Rubin has been appointed Chief Executive and Executive Chair Designate of the ESRC.
- <u>Professor Philip Nelson to serve as EPSRC Executive Chair for six months</u>. Professor Philip Nelson will
  serve as the Executive Chair of the Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council (EPSRC) when it
  becomes part of UK Research and Innovation (UKRI).
- Appointments to the Councils of UK Research and Innovation (deadline: 13th November 2017). Do you
  want to play a vital role in the UK's research and innovation system and a key part in creating a new,
  ground-breaking organisation? UK Research and Innovation is a new organisation that, from 1 April 2018,
  will bring together the seven Research Councils, Innovate UK and Research England. UKRI intends to be
  an outstanding organisation that ensures the UK maintains its world-leading position in research and
  innovation.
- Horizon 2020 Work Programme (2018 2020) includes focus areas for addressing 'big ticket' challenges.
   The European Commission has presented the final Work Programme for Horizon 2020, which includes the novelty of four focus areas that are expected to create an exceptional impact, addressing 'big ticket' challenges.
- RAE All sectors of the economy stand to benefit from Al. The Royal Academy of Engineering welcomes the publication of "Growing the artificial intelligence industry in the UK".
- A New Guide to Help Universities Accelerate Action on the SDGs. A new guide from the Sustainable
  Development Solutions Network (SDSN) Australia/Pacific highlights the important role universities in
  Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific have in implementing the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)
  and provides practical guidance on how they can accelerate their contributions.
- Global leaders urged to address 'fragile progress' on tackling superbugs. Government ministers, scientists, industry, and civil society leaders met in Berlin for an international conference to discuss how to accelerate efforts to tackle rising drug-resistant infections which already kill 700,000 people a year worldwide.
- International Development Secretary sets out UK commitment to jobs and prosperity in the world's poorest
  countries. The International Development Secretary Priti Patel has provided details on how the UK will
  create jobs and to help accelerate economic growth that can lift countries out of poverty, through a
  continued commitment to the UK's Development Finance Institution.
- <u>UK government's Humanitarian Reform Policy</u>. The UK is setting out a new Humanitarian Reform Policy, which explains both innovations and improvements in the UK's humanitarian response, and pushes for a more ambitious reform of the international humanitarian system.
- <u>UN General Assembly 72<sup>nd</sup> meeting (update)</u>. The first two resolutions have been published, with updates continuing over time.
- WHO launches new leadership, new priorities. WHO's Director-General launched his new cabinet this
  month. New priorities include Universal Health Coverage, climate change, and access to medicines and a
  special session of the Executive Board will be convened in November to agree a future global programme of
  work for the agency.
